Clinical Education Evening on Suicide with Jim Smith

The best way to describe this evening with Jim Smith is what I walked away with for my own use.

Suicide doesn't just happen. There has been an internal process that finally led up to suicidal behavior. The internal process can be hidden from others until the actual external behavior brings attention from others.

So when I was working with a student who was very angry to a point where he got up and punched a hole in the wall, I used what Jim had spoken of and I questioned and explored both the iceberg and any stressful external or traumatic events in this particular student's life. The picture of past hurt and major loss came forward very clearly. Anger was a way of coping with these feelings that he had kept hidden for many years.

Taking what we heard from Jim, that suicide doesn't just happen, I also looked at the student's behavior as something that just didn't happen. Whether suicide or punching a hole, taking the time to explore and question the internal process that lead up to the external behavior helped me working with this intense situation.

The other piece I took away was the question "What's it like being you?" I used this question at the end of a session with a client that had made an internal change. The question worked to help in the anchoring process. It just naturally kept the client connected with their own inter-

nal process by telling me what it was like being them from their new internal perspective.

What are Our Training for Trainers Graduates Doing Now?

Ed: The following is a letter from Don Potkins who graduated from the Training for Trainers Program in 2000. Here is his quote in the Wisdom Box of August 2000.

"An excellent experience. I came away with more than I had hoped, personally and professionally. The Institute is to be applauded."

Ed: And now ... here's Don.

Dear SIP Members:

Just a note to inform you of what is happening with the Satir Model and also with me, in the Caribbean. moved to Grand Cayman, Cayman Islands in September of 2003. In negotiation with the Director of the Department of Substance Abuse Services and the management team I have been granted the opportunity to teach all of the department clinical staff the Satir Model. The clinical staff consists of 11 residential workers, 4 outpatient counsellors, one family therapist, 2 youth workers, the outpatient clinical supervisor, the department head and 3 support staff.

I obtained permission from John and Kathlyne as well as Stephen Smith, Anne Morrison and Judy Ferris to utilize their work in training Level The training began February 2nd and runs until the end of June. I have been presented with some interesting obstacles. Scheduling this group has been a challenge but with some imagination and the support of the head of department, challenges have been overcome.

I have taken the level one training manual and submitted it to the Canadian Addiction Counsellors Certification Board, who have granted 60 core education hours. (This means that it can be used as education hours to get certification and hours for re-certification.) This is also under consideration by the Florida state certification

board and I expect to hear from them in the near future

I have been asked by the department of Substance Abuse Services to submit a proposal to present at the Caribbean multi-disciplinary conference of the Caribbean in May of this year, regarding the Satir Model. I have also submitted a proposal to present at the Canadian Addiction Certification Board Conference in Toronto in September of this year, supported by the Department of Substance Abuse Services.



It appears that one of my dreams, also shared by Stephen Smith, to develop a Satir Residential Treatment Program for addiction is nearing fulfilment. Steve, John and I attempted to get Maple Ridge Treatment Centre to move in this direction

as early as 1994. Finally, ten years later it looks as though it will become a reality.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those people who have been a support to me and helped me in the development of the Satir Model in the Caribbean; firstly to my family for allowing me the time and giving me the support to keep going. To John and Kathlyne, without whose support, friendship, direction and leadership this could never have happened. To Stephen Smith without whose friendship, support and assistance I would never have left working for others. To Anne Morrison for all of her encouragement and faith in my ability to pull this off. To Michael Callaghan for all of his assistance and support as well as providing opportunities and information. I would like to thank all of those others who I do not have the space to thank - Sean, Wendy, Bruce, Beth, John, Mary - and everyone else who has offered help to me along the way.

Satir Around the World

Virginia Satir Institute Czech Republic

The roots of Satir work in the Czech Republic began in 1979 "during a time of hopelessness and decline" when Peter Bos, the founder of Czech family, met Virginia and invited her to come to work with 40 people in two weeks. She did so without permission from authorities. Virginia had one big courage stick!

Olga Holubova founded the institute with the support of Peter Bos in 1987. Through Olga's efforts, Satir trainers were brought in over the years and area professionals were thoroughly trained in the model, ultimately resulting in the creation of the Satir institute there. "Olga was an Avanta member, she studied Satir's Growth Model in the USA and worked selflessly (and often in very original ways) on spreading the Model in the Czech lands and Slovakia," writes Milada. Olga died July 2002 and is a great loss to all of us.

The work of the institute continues on through the work being done conducting growth activities and training and educating professionals. Our Czech friends have even gone as far as achieve government licensure of their four year professional psychotherapy training called MOVISA (Model Virginia Satir). This license from the Health Ministry allows a graduate of this program to be paid by insurance. According to Malida, this will enable Virginia's ideas and resources to reach a great number of people.

Leaders from the Czech institute are also busy presenting at conferences and international congresses. They are also writing articles in journals.



Satir Centre of Singapore

Since John Banmen first introduced the Satir Growth Model to Singapore, four post-graduate training courses have been completed and numerous two-day workshops have been conducted, writes Anna Low. Two other trainers, Maria Gomori and Kathlyne Maki-Banmen have also conducted trainings there and Marie Lam has been doing Satir training in Mandarin, making the Satir model accessible to even more people. Anna estimates that up to 300 people have attended some kind of training so far. The institute currently has a web site and has plans some time later this year or early next year to discuss setting up the Satir Centre of Singapore. Let's send loving support to this centre in the midst of gestation. Keep your eyes open. The Centre is already blossoming.

Resource Corner


Schwab, J., Baldwin, M., Gerber, J., Gomori, M., & Satir, V. (1989). The Satir approach to communication: A workshop manual. Palo Alto, CA: Science and Behavior Books.

This is an excellent, practical workbook that brings together Satir's theory and practice regarding human communication. It is a hands-on guide for facilitators who are already familiar with and use Satir's concepts and methods.

Schwab et al. provide complete descriptions of exercises, followed by processes for reflection, in a clear and direct style. They include administrative details, an overview of the workshop process, and details such as the materials and length of time needed for each exercise. The concepts and ideas in this manual are suitable for workshops of any size, as well as individual and family learning experiences. The experiential exercises include the application of intellec-

tual, visual, auditory, kinesthetic, and relational modalities. The authors also present principles for the role of the facilitator, with an emphasis on the use of Self as a powerful tool for teaching others. Schwab et al. offer a clear and simple guide to using Satir's dense and complex techniques for facilitating experiential learning. Satir's recommendation to facilitators: "Have an enlightening, fun time learning" (p. xii).
